Catechism Review: The Lord's Prayer (part 2) "Hallowed Be Your Name"

"Hallowed be thy name." (Be honest, those words seem a little old fashioned. We don't talk like that anymore. Those words were an old English translation from the Greek words of the New Testament. Modern translations of the original Greek might say, "Your name is holy," or even "Holy is your name!

Hallow, holy, and sacred are really all the same word. They have to do with God. When we talk about God who is so much infinitely bigger than a word) it is a holy moment, hallowed ground, and a sacred time," for God is holy.

Was "hallowed be your name" a statement? "Yes! God's name is holy?" A request? "I sure hope you are God?" A proclamation grounded in awe? "Wow, You are holy!" Jesus makes clear that even the name we use to call God is as holy and sacred as God himself! The name and God are the same! So, how can a name be holy?

Think about it this way: As soon as we name something we define it. We limit it. We control it. If I say "red," you imagine something red. If I say "sorrow," you are filled with emotion. When we say, "God," we conjure an Image. Each of us responds to any word with different images and emotions. No one's thoughts exactly resemble those of others. To comprehend what that God means is to come into contact with what can't be defined and is the awesome miracle of "Holy." Prayer places us into that Presence.

Everyone has seen an actor or athlete standing in the spotlight. What a moment of glory! Jesus wants us to remember prayer is our connection with God. He is THE focus! Prayer pulls us into the glow of HIS Holy Light. These words remind us that prayer is entering the living room of heaven, surrounded by spotlights and stars and angel choirs!

Luther said we can better understand how to keep God's name holy if we first look at how we make his name unholy. He said we do this when we misuse God's name in order to commit sin or steal his name and keep its power for our own.

That gives us a point of reference, for we are often best at unholy things; such as lying,

cheating, not forgiving or not loving. Such moments are abusing the name of God! That is stealing his Name.

Luther once wrote, "holy is nothing else than withdrawing something from misuse and dedicating it to its proper godly use, just as a church is dedicated and appointed solely to the service of God."

In this prayer we are pulled from selfish, shortsighted needs and encouraged to be one with God, that God might make all things holy ... even through us! Prayer is truly a sacramental moment!

Jesus reminds that even the name of God is holy, as any word we use to express God is holy. Any thought or understanding of God is likewise to be holy. When the name of God rolls off our lips we touch the very Being who created galaxies and microscopic cells. And the infinite, eternal, all powerful Creator touches us!

This is important, for how we use THE Name shows how we define what THE Name means to us. It tells others what we believe. Prayer is not impersonal like an email or text message, but instead transports us into the courts of heaven and the presence of God!

To know the Holy Name is to know the secrets of the universe and the power of heaven.

To say "Your Name is Holy" is to claim what the name means. To say "God" means we believe, and are grasped by the Holy. If we use the name in any other way, we demean the gift of grace that God's name is! To engage in holy talk means we have faith. In these words, Jesus teaches us how to connect in prayer.

When we remember the presence, power, and gift of the Holy One, we are more likely to be faithful and responsible in how we live, and love, and even how we die.

Of course God is holy, whether anyone believes or understands completely what that means. But in this prayer we are reminded that his holy touch can change our broken and imperfect lives.

How glorious that the holy One make us One with him ... in life, in death, and forever. — tws

ASH WEDNESDAY and LENT Beginning February 14!

Traditions, such as Lent, often seem irrelevant in a modern society. Whether a new experience or not, Lent is a powerful opportunity for your life of faith, and your preparation for Easter.

Lent is a special opportunity for thought-full reflection and spiritual growth. It is a routine that might even change your daily routine throughout the entire year.

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent.

Lent is a forty day journey to prepare us for Holy Week and Easter. The forty days are a reminder of what Israel learned in their forty years in the desert. It has the feel of Jonah's wait in the belly of a whale, Noah's boat ride, and Jesus' forty day temptation as his ministry began.

Lent remembers Jesus' loving journey to a cross and tomb, so that all the days of our lives will be flavored by his love for us.

Ash Wednesday is February 14 Noon and 6:30 pm.

Ash Wednesday is a somber day of repentance and trust in the saving love of Jesus. This is the darkest day of the year as we reflect on our brokenness and that Christ's sacrifice for us comes from a love we don't deserve and is given with no guarantee of a response.

We are used to making a sign of the cross (with ash), saying "you are dust and to dust you shall return." This is both a hint of earth's power, and the victory of the cross.

Midweek services begin February 21 Noon and 6:30 pm.

For several years, we have used familiar books, movies, and stories to better visualize the meaning of the themes of Lent. This year we will use a classic movie titled "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" to help illustrate Lenten themes.

While our meditations are based firmly in Scripture, such contemporary resources can be

helpful in understanding what we have maybe made too difficult about faith to fully appreciate and understand. Join us for this interesting Lenten series.

"Water in the Desert"

This is the theme of this year's Lenten devotional booklet, written by Zion's ministry staff. This resource is meant to assist with your daily walk through Lent. It will feature brief, daily devotion and a question, prayer, or suggestion for follow through as you consider the loving ministry Jesus has called us into.

The meaning of Lent

Lent comes from a word meaning "spring." And what is Lent but the spring cleaning of our spiritual lives? This offers a wonderful opportunity, in a special way, for spiritual housecleaning, to assist in getting us ready to celebrate the passionate love of the cross and an empty tomb.

For hundreds of years, Christians have embraced traditions of fasting, meditation, and works of love as the disciplines of Lent. Giving up something during Lent is a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice for us, and a wonderful tradition, if it is truly a sacrifice and is tied to your Lenten journey with Jesus.

Many also choose also to add something new to life as an aid in this journey! Maybe daily devotions, or an hour each week devoted to some mission? Maybe more time for prayer and the discipline of joining with your faith family in Lenten worship?

There are many opportunities in Zion and our community to serve others through Loaves and Fishes or other outreach efforts. It is all about making Easter the incredible time of life-changing joy that it truly can be! This also is an opportunity to welcome and invite others who have no church home!

Worship Help for Parents and Children

(It is OK for everyone else to read too!)

"Scripture Readings and Sermon"

For Dads and Moms and other adults:

Like any book the Bible is full of words. These words are God's gift of revealing his plan of creation, his parental disappointment when people sin or turn away from Him, and his loving plan to bring us back. Since we can't see God, He uses word pictures to help us see Him more clearly.

When we talk about the Bible being "The Word of God" we must be careful. The Bible proclaims the Living Word, which is Christ Jesus, but the Bible is not God. The words in the Bible come from God, but those words are not God. We must always be clear that we worship the God of the Bible, not the book we call the Bible!

The words of scripture were gathered over hundreds of years as faithful people put remembrances, teachings, and stories passed from generation to generation into writing. God guided this process, as the writers were inspired by His Holy Spirit. These words have life and inform our lives of faith, worship, and hope for eternal life with God.

The use of Holy Scripture is rooted in Judaism. In Jesus' day a reading from the Law or Prophets, was followed by explanation of that text by a rabbi (teacher.) We follow this same routine in the Christian Church, adding the New Testament. As the words from God are proclaimed, we are touched by God just as surely as in Baptism and Holy Communion.

Each week we read from the Old Testament, an Epistle, and the Gospel. Until 1973 we used a 1 year lectionary. There is now a 3 year series of readings for Sundays & festivals designated as "A,B,C." Each year most of the Gospels are from one writer. "A" is Matthew. "B" is Mark. "C" is Luke. Selections from John are included within each series. This year we use Series B so most of our Gospel readings are from Mark.

The three readings are chosen to reflect the same theme. They are based on the season of the church year, and speak to needs of all times. Sermons are usually based on one or all of those readings, The sermon seeks to open the text to help it be relevant and useful for us in our daily lives of faith. Whether we read the scriptures or talk about them in a sermon, our prayer is that whoever proclaims God's words will be open to the Holy Spirit's guidance (just as those who listen, should have the same prayer.)

For Parents with Younger Children

Too many words can confuse. And attention spans can be short (for children too!) Just as adults do better reading and hearing when they have some familiarity with the text (i.e. Bible study) so children do better with words they understand and questions they want to ask.

Our children's bulletins seek to help the children find a theme that the readings might convey. The illustration on the cover of the bulletin also helps focus on a theme for the day. This pattern of A-B -C helps introduce them basic themes and words about faith.

We are always looking for ideas from parents for what we can do to help. Parents should never assume their children aren't hearing — and asking questions afterward will help you to answer questions or make applications on their level.

When you hear something in a text or sermon that might apply in your own family life — jot a note down and use that to begin a conversation in the car or around the dinner table. The bags with crayons, books, and even puppets aren't simply to keep kids busy. Our kids often will act out what they are feeling or draw something that reflects what they are hearing.

God's Word is never wasted, it is just that sometimes we get in its way! Sunday School helps parents begin a lifelong growth in being changed by God's Words. Our confirmation and youth ministry programs continue to explore and assist our young people in their faith journey.

Always remember, Jesus is the Living Word. God's Word speaks through Scripture and helps bring Jesus' love and practical call into our lives.

Let us know how else we can help you with your words about "the Word."

Book Review: A Thousand Words: Reflections on Art and Christianity. Mary Elizabeth Podles. St. James Press. 2023

For those interested in how art can enrich faith, this is book that should be read. It was on my Christmas list and thankfully Santa came through for me. Mary Podles is an art historian, has curated in major American museums, and spent considerable time lecturing around the country and writing for various publications.

This book contains a collection of articles she has written for a Christian journal called Touchstone. Each article deals with a familiar piece of Christian art, exploring their background and usefulness for us today. She make each work of art come alive with her explanations. The faith background, as the inspiration for each piece, adds greatly to understanding such art.

Here is a review from the book jacket: "This delightfully written book gives an entrée into sacred art that is deeply rooted in history and theology Art is a visual language, but most of us do not know how to 'read' that language. Podles' richly detailed interpretations offer readers an insightful guide to Western religious art."

She covers a variety of examples of art such as sculpture, an illuminated manuscript, familiar renaissance paintings and altar pieces, and items such as crosses and crowns. It is beautifully illustrated and, as mentioned already, each essay is only one thousand words long. This is an incredible resource that is worth looking for.

As examples, she discusses he Pantheon in Greece and Hagia Sophia in Constantinople. She explores the rationale for changes in architecture from different periods of Christian history, and a items such a chalices and wall hangings. Some of the more familiar pieces of at from the Italian Renaissance and wood carvings from the Gothic period in Europe are included as well.

The following examples of her writing deal with completely different art forms from different countries and periods of history.

In discussing Raphael's painting of the Sistine Madonna (which has two of the most memorable little cherubs who appear bored with all that is going on above them) she writes: 'A golden light

slow outward from the center, as if the Virgin were indeed clothed with the sun (and the curve of Sixtus's cope may be meant to suggest the cure of the moon beneath her feet. "[112]

Discussing a simple crucifix located outside a tiny church in Taos New Mexico, she writes: "Here, then, are none of the glass eyes and jeweled teardrops of the Baroque, just the forms essential to convey the nobility and sadness of the suffering Christ, a simplicity appropriate to a country church out in the spare landscape of the New Mexican desert. [183]

This is beautifully illustrated and the text for each piece of art she discusses is limited to one thousand words. That allows for a variety of art to be discussed, and insures that the discussions don't get too technical or dry. She writes extremely well and is very easy to understand.

Whether your are knowledgeable when it comes to the discussion of works of art or this is your introduction, the beauty of this book is that everyone will appreciate and grow through her discussions she shares. there is not doubt that all of us will learn to look in a fresh, new way at any art that is inspired by faith.

Understanding the artist's technique adds so much to understanding the art as a means of inspiring, and reveals how images can often say so much more than a collection of words. This is so important in viewing any art as it is more inspiring and edifying when we understand why it was created, who created it, and the means and motive of its shaping.

Art is so important to our Christian heritage, as Dr. Paul Maier would be quick to remind all of us. From 2nd century mosaics in Israel to modern paintings of Henry Tanner in the twentieth century, there is something in this book for everyone.

This is more than a text book (and certainly doesn't read like one. It stands as a reminder that when mere mortals allow their gifts to be inspired by God, what results is the potential to inspire many others. In other words, we are blessed to be a blessing as the art in this book reminds us and proclaims.

LWR reports 194,983 quilts went to Angola, Dominican Republic, Georgia, Guatemala, Mali, Tanzania, the Gambia and Ukraine. 35,490 baby bundles were delivered to Angola, Dominican Republic, Mali, Tanzania, Turkiye and Ukraine. We are truly blessed to be part of this mission!

Here are a few responses from our sponsor families about this year's experience. (1) One of our families shared the mother had tears in her eyes, and how appreciative she was with the generosity of our congregation. The mother also expressed how she would one day like to be able to be the giver of these gifts, and be able to share her love with a needy family, making their Christmas a very special gift of love.

- (2) Another sponsor family wrote the smiles on our family's faces grew and grew as we filled their van with gifts and food. Just when I thought their smiles could grow no further I noticed them get even bigger. The joy in their eyes was proof that God was at work in their hearts. This family was having a very tough holiday season and our congregation's support helped them make it through. Our work together helps change lives.
- (3) I don't have a special story to share other than I hope this family was blessed by the enormous generosity of our congregation. It was evident Mom was not in a good physical, mental, or emotional state when we met her, and mostly I felt for those dear children. I pray she can change her life to be a better example for her children.
- (4) Our delivery was heartwarming. The four year old was at school, and the infant was napping. We did get to meet the three year old, who was absolutely adorable. The excitement, exuberance, and joy on her face was wonderful to see.

Mom asked for some treats which were items she would not normally afford. Fruit snacks, some chips, and pretzels. We also purchased a cake with white butter cream frosting and had it decorated with a holly and ivy design and a "Christmas Blessing to You" message on the top. The 3 yr old was delighted. Two things were immediately evident to us. One, this mother of

three was truly in need of immediate help. Her second story apartment is very small. Not much furniture, no TV, no Christmas tree, very little light through the few windows, and not much in the refrigerator or freezer. Mom was very grateful for all the groceries and gifts. She was truly overwhelmed.

We invited her to come to our church services and shared her family would be in our prayers. Mom repeatedly expressed her thanks and asked we let the congregation know how much this meant to them.

As always we are in awe by the generosity of our Zion family. Gifts were carefully selected and more abundant than expected.

(5) Finally, every year seems to be a little different experience for us because the families' situations vary so much. This year, for the first time ever, we delivered gifts to what was once considered to be a conventional family. A mother and father that are married and the parents of all three children living with them. Even though they didn't have much, they clearly were glad to have each other and were hopefully happy, and grateful beyond words for the added blessing of what our congregation generously provided. There was abundant love in that home.

Dad is employed but struggles to make ends meet, especially while Mom is at home caring for their newborn. The older boys were excited to have visitors and show us the little Christmas tree in the corner of their cramped living room. We rarely get to know what become of families after our brief visit, but our impression was they are the kind of people who not only will remember the kindness showed them, but pay it forward when they are able. Such encounters leave us wishing there was some way we could bottle the whole experience and pour it out on our congregation.

Zion family, please think about these words and what God would want us to do: Christ has no body but yours. No hands, no feet on earth, but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which He blessed all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are His body. Christ has no body now on earth but yours. May you find ways to use your body to help others just like Christ did when He was on this earth.


