Reading the Bible

You cannot study the Bible unless you read the Bible. And to read the Bible you need to take time for the words to sink in and speak to you.

Bible study is essential to our understanding of faith. The following passage titled "The Bible Without Tears" offers some interesting insights that might be helpful to how you read scripture and how you allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through the inspired words you read.

This is from Frederick Buechner's book, "Wishful Thinking." HarperOne. 1993.

1. Don't start at the beginning and try to plow your way straight through to the end. At least not without help. If you do, you're almost sure to bog down somewhere around the twenty-fifth chapter of Exodus. Concentrate on the high points at first. There is much to reward you in the valleys too, but at the outset keep to the upper elevations. There are quite a few.

There is the vivid, eyewitness account of the reign of King David, for instance (2 Samuel plus the first two chapters of 1 Kings), especially the remarkable chapters that deal with his last years when the crimes and blunders of his youth have begun to catch up with him. Or the Joseph stories (Genesis 39-50). Or the Book of Job. Or the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7). Or the seventh chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans, which states as lucidly as it has ever been stated the basic moral dilemma of man and then leads into the eighth chapter, which contains the classic expression of Christianity's basic hope.

2. The air in such upper altitudes is apt to be clearer and brighter than elsewhere, but if you nevertheless find yourself getting lost along the way, try a good Bible commentary which gives the date and historical background of each book, explains the special circumstances which it was written to meet, and verse by verse tries to illumine the meaning of the difficult sections.

Even when the meaning seems perfectly clear, a commentary can greatly enrich your understanding. The Book of Jonah, for instance—only two or three pages long and the one genuine comedy in the Old Testament—takes on added significance when you discover its importance in

advancing the idea that God's love is extended not just to the children of Israel but to all mankind.

- 3. If you have even as much as a nodding acquaintance with a foreign language, try reading the Bible in that. Then you stand a chance of hearing what the Bible is actually saying instead of what you assume it must be saying because it is the Bible. Some of it you may hear in such a new way that it is as if you had never heard it before. "Blessed are the meek" is the way the English version goes, whereas in French it comes out, "Heureux sont les débonnaires" (Happy are the debonair). The debonair of all things! Doors fly open. Bells ring out.
- 4. If you don't know a foreign language, try some English version that you've never tried before—the New English Bible, Goodspeed's translation, J. B. Phillips's New Testament, or any other you can lay your hands on. The more far-out the better. Nothing could be farther out than the Bible itself. The trouble with the King James or Authorized Version is that it is too full of Familiar Quotations. The trouble with Familiar Quotations is that they are so familiar you don't hear them.

When Jesus was crucified, the Romans nailed over his head a sign saying "King of the Jews" so nobody would miss the joke. To get something closer to the true flavor, try translating the sign instead: "Head Jew."

- 5. It may sound like fortune-telling, but don't let that worry you. Let the Bible fall open in your lap and start there. If you don't find something that speaks to you, let it fall open to something else.
- 6. If somebody claims that you have to take the Bible literally, word for word, or not at all, ask him if you have to take John the Baptist literally when he calls Jesus the Lamb of God.
- 7. Finally this. If you look *at* a window, you see fly-specks, dust, the crack where Junior's Frisbie hit it. If you look *through* a window, you see the world beyond.

Something like this is the difference between those who see the Bible as a Holy Bore and those who see it as the Word of God which speaks out of the depths of an almost unimaginable past into the depths of ourselves.

CATECHISM REVIEW: Apostles Creed (part 3)

The Second Article of the Creed proclaims the gift of Jesus, an incredible miracle of grace! We do not believe in three "gods," or one who keeps changing personalities. Instead, the God who created, also redeems this world, and daily fills it with his holy breath (Spirit.)

Every culture struggles with how to get close to God. Every religion creates rituals and physical symbols or idols to help describe God or help us "get our hands" on God.

We believe the one, true God's love is so great that He chose to come and reveal himself to us in the Body of Jesus. He carried out his mission of mercy through His life, sacrificial death, and miraculous resurrection. We believe Jesus is both completely divine and completely human.

As God's "Son" we confess Jesus is the earthly presence of the "DNA" of God. He was born as all humans are born, but His birth was a miraculous intervention of God in the life of Mary. She is his earthly mother, and the bringer of his human life, but Jesus is also God in the flesh.

The early disciples had a simple message that energized and changed their world. They simply told the story of Jesus — his miraculous birth, a perfect life of servant love, his undeserved death on our behalf, and the miraculous victory on Easter morning. Having accomplished his purpose on earth in that life, death, and resurrection, God withdrew his visible, physical presence from one time and place, so that He could be invisibly present in every time and every place.

In the same way that God breathed in Jesus, His breath of life now lives in each of us and breathes through the biblical witness and the life of Christ's body on earth today, which we call "the Church."

Article Three is about the Holy Spirit, the presence of God today. It literally means "holy breath." In Genesis God created by breathing words: "Light! Sun and Moon! Fish and People!"

He breathed and creation happened. That same breath filled the life of Jesus with servant love, powerful actions, the proclamation of God's love, and victory over sin, death, and grave. That breath fills our lungs and life in Baptism, Holy Communion, Prayer, our reading of Holy Scripture, and the faith-filled love of those around us. That "Holy Breath" inspires us to forgive and encourages us when we are weak.

God's Holy Spirit is the same force of Creation and Easter, and is the gift through which God shares Himself in each of our lives today.

Faith is simply a matter of letting God be our breath, our wisdom, and our strength. As people of faith, our call is to trust in that Holy breath, and share what is so freely given to each of us. Breathe in and breathe out!

The Holy Spirit comes in and the Holy Spirit is the love we exhale and share. His live is our living. Faith is simply allowing God to be the power of all that we are, and do, and say.

God's love is so great that He will never let us go! As God lives in each of our hearts and minds in this earthly life, his promise is that we will live with Him forever. And so even when our frail and imperfect earthly breathing ceases, that Holy Spirit (that Holy Breath) will continue to be our life, and we will be one with God forever in the eternity of heavenly peace.

This is Good News for a broken world, and more. It is great news! The Creed was easy to remember, as it contains the bullet points of faith. Every time we recite it in worship we remember what we believe and who we are called to be! In the Creed, we remember and restate what we believe. This is our mission statement, and power and guide for all that life is. The Creed is common to all Christians and contains the basics of what it means to be a disciple of Christ.

Knowing who we are helps us to remember how we are to live (filled with that same servant love.) Over and over, like a steady heartbeat or the expanding and contracting of lungs, we live this faith. It comes to as a gift and is shared in how we live as a gift for those around us. In this Creed we remember, we renew, and we proclaim what we believe.

The Apostles' Creed proclaims God's love, his mission, and his presence in our lives. One God, one love, one faith. It was the earliest and most essential statement of the early Church. — tws

Echoes

God IS at work through people in our congregation...here is their story:

One of the most challenging outcomes of being a DCE comes with time. Students graduate and usually move on to a new location. It's painful to see former students not involved in a faith community. It's easy to think of all the time and experiences spent with them was useless. But everyone has a different faith journey. Many have a faith that gets stronger and many return to their walk with Christ. Some leave for good. But God is always at work, whether or not we see the results.

I have a former student who struggled most of her life. She would have a strong faith one year and then be very open about a lacking relationship with Christ the next year. THORNS

CAMPUS MINISTRY REPORT

WMU held 9 Summer Orientation for incoming freshmen. One of the events during each session is called the Involvement Zone.

Involvement Zone is where student organizations on campus get the chance to promote their organization and activities to the incoming freshmen. This summer, these sessions are happening on Monday and Thursday afternoons. COVID had a significant impact on Involvement Zone events last summer, there were only 20 or so student organizations that took part v. around 60 previously. Book Review. The Luminous Dusk; Finding God in the Deep, Still Places." Dale C. Allison Jr. Eerdmans. 2006.

Dale Allison offers an insightful book that one must read slowly and thoughtfully. It consists of a series of essays dealing with our search for God in thoughtful reflection, daily living, and prayer.

The title is fantastic. Dusk is the time of day when the light is fading and darkness is approaching, and yet there is a special light that is difficult to miss. Photographers and sunset gazers love this special time of light, as it reveals much that is missed in the stark brightness of the midday sun.

So it is with our search for God or plea for him to answer prayers or make himself known in the midst of the hustle and bustle or noise and bright lights of daily living. Too often we are blinded by our culture, our schedules, traffic, and failure to find quiet places of shadow where we have a better chance of hearing God's voice and call.

Consider what contributes most to our attitudes, hopes, fears, and dreams. It is what we see. It is what we fear. It is what is loudest and most persistent, whether at work, on the tube, or in our internet and Facebook searches. We are surrounded by bright lights and powerful voices and that affects us in powerful and daily ways.

How often in our daily moments, however, do we hear the voice of God or feel his gentle presence? We ask God for what we need when we pray. In worship or Bible study we seek guidance and hope to feel his presence. But for most waking hours (if we are honest) we are swept along with the tides and currents often beyond our control. We say we believe, but what is it that we really believe and what is it we have trouble believing? These are important questions. Allison writes"

What accounts for the medieval tendency to believe, or for the modern tendency to disbelieve? [Our] seeming secularization correlates directly with a growing physical separation for the so-called natural world. IN other words, the more we have moved indoors, the less some of us have been inclined to believe. Socrates maintained that philosophy has no foundation other than the feeling of wonder. Aristotle later concurred and in doing so went on to instance, as the chief objects of wonder, the moon, the sun, and the stars. Now it could also be said that religion, like philosophy

being with wonder, or at least that religion without wonder is dead. [7]

(I told you this book must be read slowly!) in his opening chapter he reminds us how much time the ancients spent watching the stars at night (which our artificial and abundant light obscure.) They saw stars as glimpses into the place of the Creator and watched them night after night for hints of divine presence and answers.

Such a primitive view is dismissed easily, and yet the world around us is a gift of God and each and every part of it contains the life of God. To ignore the obvious is to miss the most important. We find our efforts so often engaged in how to use or protect what we call nature, but we do so because of laws or public pressure and outcry and lose the sense of the holy presence that is not only created but controlled by God ... not by us!

Even in our study of scripture we miss the obvious as we race from passage to passage or don't slowly consider the full impact of stories we already know so well (just as we assume there are stars at night which the abundance of street lights prevents us from seeing.)

He takes, for instance the feeding of five thousand in Mark 6. Mark's Gospel contains only the basics, unlike the artistic details of John. Mark seldom mentions color, sound, or light. And yet, almost incidentally, mentions Jesus had the crowd sit down on "green" grass. Allison writes:

We are given an equation to be solved: shepherd + green grass + having no lack + being beside the water = reclining = the Twenty-third Psalm. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want ..."
But how many modern readers see this? [105]

This book is one to be read a chapter or page at a time as an aid in remembering what we take for granted and how the bright lights of a busy world overshadow the subtle shades of God's presence and power. It can help you to slow down and find ways to look, even in the darkness, to find the light of God's loving presence, power, and peace.

We need to find quiet places, like the facing light of dusk, or a time of quiet prayer (with more listening than speaking) to better see the glory of the Lord and the powerful loving presence of faith.
