In our culture, Christmas has an intense emotional, financial, and traditional buildup. Not so for Easter! It isn't even a vacation time for school as it once was, unless it happens to fall over spring break. Where the church once had influence over culture, now it is school boards.

Maybe it is a blessing our culture has not taken over Holy Week as it has Christmas. This allows us to prepare for what God has done, rather than wrestle with the commercial distortions and distractions of a broken world. To celebrate an empty tomb when so many are trying to find more ways to fill their lives with stuff makes what we do on Easter even more precious.

This year the staff produced a devotional booklet to give practical, daily help with your journey through Lent. Our midweek services this year feature the characters and themes from the movie "Close Encounters." We have done so to use familiar cultural themes just as Jesus did with this stories and parables. This assists in imagining what God means to and for us. We hope you are enjoying such support in this season.

Holy Week is holy as it celebrates the beginning of a new creation — much like the seven days of creation in Genesis. We celebrate the re-creation of a paradise that was lost, and the healing of the brokenness we call sin and death. Mark your calendars now, and make this "Holy Week" worship a powerful gift to nourish your faith.

And realize how important these special worship services are an opportunity to invite those with no church home to join you here. Whom might you invite. There are some who have never heard the story, or have forgotten it and might just be waiting for an easy way to wander back in.

The Sunday of the Passion / March 24

We will remember Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem to shouts of Alleluia, and also how quickly the tone changed as his mission was headed not to an earthly throne but a cross.

Maundy Thursday / March 28

Join us to remember Jesus "last meal" and his parting words to "love one another." We celebrate Holy Communion and remember the beginning of Jesus' passion. Our drama that night will focus on the Passover meal and how it was "filled full" by Jesus' acts of love.

Good Friday / March 29

The three hour service beginning at noon focuses on Jesus' words from the cross. It contains six half hour services in which you come when you can, leave when you must.)

The evening worship focuses on Jesus passion and his death. Scripture, prayer and music help our meditation at the foot of the cross.

The Easter Vigil / March 30

This service remembers the disciples vigil at the tomb, and recalls all the promises that would be fulfilled on Easter.

Catechism Review — Lord's Prayer (part 3) "Your Kingdom Come"

When my daughter Abby was three, like every child her age, she controlled a vast kingdom. The imagination of a child is empowered by their lack of holding back or wondering how things might be.

With crayons she would draw the way she saw her world. She named stuffed animals and decided whether they would sit close to her or were banished to the closet! She controlled conversations with dolls, and decided if our family room would be a classroom or a magic kingdom. She truly was master of her kingdom.

As we pray "your kingdom come," we aren't thinking about 3 year olds, but maybe we should be! Innocently, they reveal what we think we can hide. They have not yet been so burdened with adult wisdom and are free to see wonder and joy in so much that we take for granted.

In our maturity we think we can control many kingdoms such as health and wealth, vocation and recreation, even family and friends. Our goal is to be masters of our lives, and when we fail or hit speed bumps along the way, we complain about how unfair life is. In truth, this is our attempt to control God. It is our effort to define how God should act, according to what we want, need, or deserve. This is our effort to bring God into the borders of our earthly kingdom.

Luther had something to say about this in the following words: "The kingdom of God comes of itself, without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may also come to us also." Jesus teaches us to pray by saying, "Dear Father, may your kingdom be the one I want to live in!"

That is crucial because we want our kingdom to become God's, rather than surrendering by faith to life in his kingdom. Listen closely to the words of this petition: "Dear Father in heaven, may YOUR kingdom come TO ME!"

God has created a miraculous kingdom of faith, hope, and love, In these words we ask God to help us see it and live in it, and quit trying to make His kingdom look like ours. These simple words remind that we are talking to God about his world, his plan, and our role in it. And then we need to be quiet, listen, remember, and learn. These words remind us that God is beyond our

control! He will be God and He will do "God-stuff," whether we understand how or not. God will be God whether we vote for him to be so or not.

As we remember the playing field, the rules, and decide to join in, we are ready to enjoy life and celebrate God's love.

Our first family dog, Nike, is still sorely missed. One of her unique qualities was she knew the boundaries of our yard. I don't know how she did it, as we never had a fence, but she knew where her kingdom ended and the next ones began. Because she knew where she lived, there wasn't a need for a fence or chain. She was free to live within the freedom of that kingdom that we all shared. (What a lesson she gave our family.)

Part of growing up is figuring out who is in charge of the kingdom, and temper tantrums of little children are all about testing those waters. (And what a painful struggle that can be!) No matter how long or intense, there always comes a point when the initial reason for the tantrum is forgotten. But a child has invested so much energy that the chain reaction can't be stopped. A parent can out scream and out yell and threaten, but the tantrum will only grow more out of control. A time of peace is needed before anything can change.

When Mom or Dad can finally distract their little angel from such devilish behavior, and get close enough to wipe a tear and give the hug of love, the moment is blessed with the element of grace.

As love again is the focus, a smile will usually shine from behind the clouds of tears. In that moment, whether stated or not, a child's true feelings are, "thanks for helping me stop the madness, because I had no clue how to make the crying end." Love does that, just like this prayer!

Jesus teaches us the same thing with this prayer! The simple words "YOUR Kingdom" distract us from the selfish fears and dreams of making or losing the worlds of our imagination and desires.

"Your kingdom" stops us in our tracks. Whatever we ask or thank for next, our tantrum is over and God's love colors and interprets whatever we say or hear next. May we learn from this prayer and pray to live in this love. His kingdom it is!

Worship Help for Parents and Children

(It is OK for everyone else to read too!)

"The Creed"

Creed is a Latin word meaning, "I believe." For our purposes it states what a Christian believes. It is our statement of faith.

Our Creeds cover basic teachings as revealed in Scripture. We believe in the Creative Plan of the Father, the Sacrificial Rescue of the Son, and God's invisible Spirit-presence today. Our God reveals all that he is in these three ways.

Creeds were the earliest part of Christian worship, added to forms already in existence (prayers, scripture reading, a message or explanation of the readings, and psalms or hymns.) When many were illiterate, and manuscripts rare, people memorized to remember.

They couldn't download from the internet, but could download it from their memory! This allowed each generation to teach the next. It is how the faith was shared.

Normally we recite the Apostles' Creed. The written form is from the 3rd century AD. It came from the teachings of the Apostles (their sermon notes?") and was used as the Baptismal liturgy.

As we recite, we proclaim, "THIS is what I believe! God is my loving Father! Jesus (God in the flesh) lived, died, and rose for me! The Holy Spirit (God's breath in me) makes me part of the Body of Christ (the Church) forever!"

As we repeat those words, we remember what we believe, and teach the faith to children and even visitors who maybe have no faith background. Wherever Christians gather, this celebrates that even with many denominations, for there is only ONE Church! Every Sunday, throughout the world, Christians all proclaim this one, true faith!

When we say "holy, catholic Church" the word catholic means "universal." (That means there are Roman Catholics, Lutheran Catholics, Methodist Catholics, but only ONE Christian Church! Despite our human-inspired differences in practice, we are all part of ONE Church! That is something we need remember more often!

The Nicene Creed developed in response to false teachers who said Jesus was only a good man." It dates from the Council of Nicea in 325. We have typically used it on Festival Sundays, but it can be used in any time of worship.

The Athanasian Creed was likely developed during the 5th or 6th century, and named for Athanasius (a staunch defender of the deity of Christ during some of the heresies of the 4th century.) It's length keeps its usage rare, but you should read and use it as a devotional and great guide for prayer. Our creeds are printed in our hymnals and catechisms.

For Parents with Younger Children:

As parents, much of our time is teaching our kids to believe the right things such as stoves are hot, look twice before crossing a street, we will always love you, and God loves you always!

Repetition and love are always the key! That is why we say the creed so often for that is how we memorize and remember. Have your kids follow the words when the Creed is spoken — they will learn it quickly.

Take time to ask your children what they believe about the weather, your love for them, their favorite foods, or anything. Then ask what they believe about God. Show them our stained glass window and point out the three Latin words "credo." That means "I believe."

Our window celebrates God as Father (all-seeing eye), Son (lamb), and Holy Spirit (dove.) Help your children understand how the Creed reminds and teaches, just like the window. What we remember we are less likely to forget.

Show them a family picture of cousins, uncles, and aunts. Talk about how they are all one family because of what they have in common. Explain the Creeds are similar reminders that show how what we believe makes us part of God's family.

Don't wait for someone else to teach them this. They are ready to hear you tell them now! Explain in your words what this means. Take time, phrase by phrase, week by week, season by season. Help your kids learn more about what their Baptism means!

Psalm 127:3-5 (CEV) says: "Children are a blessing and a gift from the LORD. Having a lot of children to take care of you in your old age is like a warrior with a lot of arrows. The more you have, the better off you will be, because they will protect you when your enemies attack you in court."

Children are a blessing. Do you view your children as a blessing? Obviously they do not know they are blessings sometimes, however, God says they are! I like the analogy of a child to an arrow. I think this has further implications than just protection. Arrows need to be pointed and aimed in a certain direction—the target! There are outside factors beyond your control (wind, obstructions, the target keeps moving, etc) however there is more in your control than you might realize. How are you "aiming" your child? Are you pointing them to the bullseye (a relationship with Christ) or are you getting caught up in distractions? As a parent, you can guide and you can encourage a certain path but once that arrow flies, it is out on it's own. In your time with your child be sure to help them see through the distractions, the busyness, and all that might hinder, and help them see the true target of Jesus.

CAMPUS MINISTRY REPORT: FEBRUARY

From 2012-2020, our Bronco Buddy Mentoring Program was one of the biggest ministry events in our campus ministry. Each of those years, we had nearly 40 WMU students as a mentor to a Grade K-5 student at Tree of Life School in the Edison neighborhood. It was an amazing partnership that our campus ministry had with Tree of Life school and it gave WMU students a chance to live out their faith and serve as a role model and example for the kids at Tree of Life. We also found that the kids/students at Tree of Life had a huge impact on our lives as well.

When COVID hit, we were unable to continue our Bronco Buddy mentoring program. By the time COVID restrictions were lifted, the vast majority of the students who had served as mentors graduated, and we found it difficult to continue. I was sensing the Lord had other opportunities ahead for us, but not at the scale that we had with Bronco Buddies.

The last couple of years, we volunteered at the Kalamazoo YWCA and at Maple Street Middle School. Meanwhile, I had always hoped we could renew the partnership we had with Tree of Life.

In late January, a group of 15 WMU athletes and I went to Tree of Life and spent the lunch/recess hour playing games with the kids at Tree of Life in their gym. There were WMU softball players, track and field athletes and football players that volunteered.

After talking with the athletes and getting feedback from them about their experience that day, we are looking at volunteering once a month at Tree of Life. Our next event is scheduled for Monday February 26th. I am hopeful this new outreach endeavor will become our renewed connection with the students and staff at Tree of Life School.

Our Monday evening Dinner and Discussion events at Solid Grounds continue to be meaningful to the students. Attendance this semester is down due to several students having Monday evenings classes. We are having 5-6 students attend our Monday evening events.

I continue to enjoy serving and calling on the home bound members of Zion. I spend Tuesday and Friday afternoons calling on them. God's blessings and peace to you all, Pastor Mark

Book Review: "Wounded Prophet; A Portrait of Henri J.M. Nouwen." Michael Ford. 1999. 2002

My first encounter with Nouwen was when I read his book, "The Wounded Healer." It has become a classic and is so powerful in its witness to the compassionate Christ.

We can relate so much easier to a savior who has suffered for us, than one who demands obedience from a distance. Christ is powerful because we can relate to hunger, thirst, pain, and death. Because he did all that for us, we are more apt to pay attention and listen. (God is wise that way, isn't' He?)

Nouwen was an incredible gift of the Church and many of you have heard his name, read some of his books, and maybe even get daily devotions on the internet from some of his works. Michael Ford has done incredible research to provide the details of this biography of a man who was aware of his many wounds, and used them to witness his compassion and faith for those around him.

This is a very readable biography that goes into more depth than I have ever read into the life of this fascinating Christian teacher who has touched so many lives, despite his own weaknesses, confusion, and lack of confidence.

Nouwen was born in Holland (the real one) which might explain his life long fascination with the works of fellow Dutchman Vincent Van Gogh. Both lived troubled and difficult lives filled with depression and yet faith.

A Catholic priest, a clinical psychologist, and a professor of religion, he spent seven months as a monk at a Trappist Monastery in New York. For many years he taught at University of Notre Dame and later at Yale Divinity School. One entire chapter deals with his fascination with clowns, circuses, and the trapeze artists. He spent many of his later years living in a small community of developmentally disabled adults.

At one point Nouwen wrote: "I experienced connections between Vincent's struggle and my own and realize more and more that Vincent was becoming my wounded healer. He painted what I had not before dared to look at; he questioned what I had not before dared to speak about; and he entered into the spaces of my heart that I had

not dared to come close to. By doing so he brought me in touch with many of my fears and gave me the courage to go further and deeper in my search for a God who loves." [Prologue]

He was a prolific writer and speaker and has been a great influence on many people in their own spiritual journey. His work is often filled with the same searching we all face, and he is unafraid to admit his weaknesses and fears as he wrestled with God's love in his own life.

This biography adds so much to his story that he had never imagined and it is an incredible testament to the power of faith in our lives that someone who was both incredibly intelligent and has so many weaknesses and doubts was able to become the powerful witness and pastoral presence for so many.

He did not stop with easy answers but kept searching and listening for God's guidance. He seemed to gravitate to the broken place and persons in life as the place where it might be easiest to find Christ and the passion of his love. And such a search gave him confidence and hope in faith that wisdom and logic could never achieve. He was a healer for many, but wounded more than most. As such, his writings and mediations have more power because he writes from the loneliness and pain of his own life and how Christ alone was able to lift him up.

How can a circus inform faith? We can understand the role of art, but a circus? Here is his fascination with the trapeze artists. "The star was not the flyer, but the catcher whose hands were always there to welcome home. The greatest hero is the least visible. Trust the catcher!" [p. 22]

This quote dovetails well with one of his most powerful books titled "The Return of the Prodigal Son; A Story of Homecoming." and Nouwen's fascination with a painting of that scene from the Bible. His study of the father's hands as he touches the retuning son became the inspiration for the book.

This is a wonderful biography which makes his writings even more powerful as we understand the context in which Nouwen lived and grew in his faith. This book is in Zion's library.

March Art Ministry Display in Blends

"God's Green Earth"
