### A BRIEF HISTORY OF

### ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH

We annually celebrate the anniversary of the congregation in July. This year marks the 155th anniversary of the beginning of our family of Zion.

In 1868, local businessmen finalized plans to begin Zion as a Lutheran congregation. No church hierarchy or pastors were involved! Five families felt a Lutheran congregation was necessary in downtown Kalamazoo and at a kitchen table they organized Zion, so they could worship, grow in faith, and raise their children in the faith. This was, in itself, an act of faith!

The original church structure was located on Pine Street and attached to a one-room schoolhouse. A brick sanctuary was built in 1923. Over the years the congregation grew and ran out of street parking. The property was sold to Bronson Hospital in 1955 when more space was needed.

Our present sanctuary was built at that time, with an educational wing added in 1962. Recent renovations and expansion were completed in 2009. A variety of pastors, DCE's, teachers and musicians have helped to lead ministry over the years. And thousands of people of all ages and walks of life have carried out ministry as part of Zion's character and fabric.

Zion has a history of an ecumenical, multi-faceted and energetic approach to ministry. The educational, scientific, and artistic strengths of this community have always been part of the diversity and strength of Zion. Such a variety of gifts are revealed in Zion's personality and its dynamic and varied ministry efforts.

We have always been a strong emphasis on worship, outreach, and Christian education for all ages. When it was decided not to have a parochial school, a commitment made to a strong ministry for children, youth, and families. Having a library, Director of Christian Education on staff, strong youth programs, and a preschool showed that commitment.

Beginning in the 1940's outreach ministries such as Braille, Lutheran World Relief Sewing, Campus Ministry, WKZO radio, and worship at the State Hospital are evidence of our members' passion for outreach and human care. Many new outreach efforts have been added such as our regular support of Loaves and Fishes, Ministry

with Community, The Gospel Mission, the Deacons Conference, YWCA, servant events, and Little Dresses for Africa.

Music has always been central to Zion and we have been blessed with musicians, choirs, and even assistance from WMU and other area musical efforts And the volunteer efforts of all of our members have continued to make Zion

For many years Stephen Ministry and Pastoral Care visitors assisted pastors in one on one ministry with members. We continue to find new ways to continue such support. Midweek dinners and funeral luncheons have become mainstays of our support for our families. Our Prayer and Prayer Shawl Ministries have recently added even more ways for members to share Christ's love with each other when difficult moments arise.

Fifty years ago an Endowment Fund was established to support ministry an annual budget would never be able to finance. This has provided church worker scholarships, mission support, creation of new ministry efforts, and major support for upgrades to property, music, worship, as well as support for Friends of Jesus Preschool, WKZO radio ministry, and Campus Ministry. Over the years, well over one million dollars for mission and ministry support has been gifted for this mission.

We remain faithful to our Lutheran heritage, but allow God's Holy Spirit to lead us through the gifts He shares. Zion's history will always be related to its vision, which is not about buildings but building the body of Christ. Our property, people, and resources are gifts God entrusts to us today, so others in the future will be touched by Zion's ministry.

Jesus created no institutions, built no buildings, and copyrighted no programs. He changed people's lives so that we can be one with Him and agents of healing and hope for the lives we touch. Zion is blessed with building, grounds, and programs, but it is the people of God who are essential to what Zion is and will become!

Zion has always sought to joyfully live in the present while anticipating a blessed future. We have been blessed to be a blessing!

### CATECHISM REVIEW: BAPTISM (part 1)

To discuss Holy Baptism, we must first understand the origins and meaning of the Sacrament. Baptism is from a Greek word meaning "to wash, sprinkle, or immerse with water." (It is the water, and not how it is administered that is crucial!) Everything begins with water, and without water nothing can be.

Genesis begins with the waters of chaos that God tamed as he issued his first words of creation. In the same way, Baptism is the creative energy of God alive in our midst. Water is the essence of life; a natural agent of cleansing. Holy Baptism is a sacred moment in which water, the life of Jesus, and God's miracle of grace are all in full force.

Many cultures use water as a ritual of cleansing or rebirth. In the Jewish tradition, converts were baptized as a sign of leaving an old life behind. John the Baptist gathered his people in the Jordan River and baptized them as a sign that they were getting ready to receive and follow the Messiah. As they came, dripping wet, out of the Jordan, John pointed them to their new, good news! Jesus joined John's crowd in that same moment, as he stood in the water, to announce the beginning of his earthly ministry of grace.

Jesus wasn't baptized because he was sinful, but to tie himself to the people he came to serve. The Jordan was their source of life, and Jesus stood with them as he brought his life to serve theirs, just as he stands with us in the water of our own Baptisms! From day one, we are never alone!

The Lutheran Church has two sacraments — Communion and Baptism. Sacrament is from a Latin word meaning mystery. Luther defined sacrament as having three elements. It is an action instituted by Christ. It uses a visible element (like water) connected to God's Word in Scripture. It shares grace in a unique way.

The Biblical witness is clear: God created a perfect world, but our rebellion has broken the loving connections between us and God, as well as with our neighbors. All of creation is touched by sin, and the ultimate sign of that brokenness is death. By grace, God draws us back to Him.

Baptism begins our journey back to God. It is initiated by God, not by us. In Baptism, we

celebrate how God restores our relationship with Him, and destroys the power of sin and the tomb. Baptism is God's grace on display!

As Jesus prepared to withdraw his visible, physical presence on the Day of Ascension, he shared these words: "Go! Make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matt. 28:19-20) This command made Baptism the welcome rite of the Christian church.

Acts 16 records a story as Paul was imprisoned for preaching the Gospel in Philippi. As he prayed behind bars, there was an earthquake and prison doors were thrown open. The jailer was going to commit suicide, fearing a mass escape. Paul and Silas stayed behind and convinced the jailer God was behind this moment. The jailer asked how he could know that. Paul said, simply, "Believe!" The jailer embraced Christ, and Paul baptized him and his entire family, and then they shared a meal. From the beginning, Baptism has been the sacrament of initiation into the faith.

Baptism and faith are always connected. Baptism announces the relationship of faith. Baptism alone does not guarantee someone will always believe or that they are immunized against sinning or even rejecting God. It simply proclaims God's will in saving rather than abandoning his people. Baptism begins a lifetime journey.

The role of the Church is to help each Christian family grow daily in understanding what the journey is all about. The role of the Church is to be the place where all the baptized gather as "one body" to worship, to support each other, and to reach out, that others might leave the darkness of life without God and know the grace which Jesus Christ has come to bring.

For this reason, Baptism is a public moment in worship, for not only are we celebrating new life in Christ, but we are celebrating another member of a bigger family of faith. Together we remember who we are and how God's love changes us. Baptism does not bring us into a solitary relationship with God but introduces us to a family that transcends all time and space. It is the Genesis of our faith journey!

### Some thoughts about change ...

Book: "The Nickel Boys" by Colson Whitehead

**Book Review.** "Kingdom, Grace, Judgment: Paradox, Outrage, and Vindication in the Parables of Jesus." Robert Farrar Capon. Eerdmans. 2002

Three books (Parables of the Kingdom, Parables of Grace, and Parables of Judgement) are combined in this one volume. For anyone who wants to wrestle with Jesus' parables, this is a wonderful, thorough, and readable book.

Capon was an Episcopal priest and was both a scholar and a gifted writer. He did not lecture or insist he alone had all the answers, but his work on the parables helps us to wrestle with the amazingly simple stories Jesus told. Such a commentary helps us unravel Gospel truths.

Here is a sample of his style: "If the world could have been saved by providing good examples we could respond to with good works, it would have been saved an hour and twenty minutes after Moses came down from Sinai" [Grace. Page 63]

We all have different learning styles, but just having the answers to a question is never enough. Anyone can memorize answers, but when you come to an answer by a process, you are more likely to not only remember but how to use what you have learned. Capon is a master at guiding you to open our heart to the Holy Spirit that Jesus' stories become your story as well!

One of Jesus' teaching styles was to tell stories, as he wanted his audience to come to a point where they learned what his message was. We tend to remember short stories well, and in doing so, we have the tools at our fingertips to help others learn what we have learned.

This quote helps you understand his process. "One of my convictions about interpreting Jesus' parables is that it is always a mistake to say too quickly what we think is their 'main point.' Had he wanted to give us glittering generalities, he could no doubt have unburdened himself of them in plain Aramaic and avoided the bother of having to make up artful stories. But in fact he did tell stories; and since he was no slouch at crafting them, we should spend more time than we do on their details." [book jacket, "The Parables of Grace."]

This is not a book to read in one sitting. It is meant to be used after you have read a parable from the Gospel and are ready to go back through it so that its vitality is more fully unpacked as you begin to unwrap the gift(s) each parable contains.

Jesus lived in a world where people were often illiterate and even if not, there wasn't much to read. And so, stories were of utmost importance in learning. Jesus parables reveal the truths he wanted his audience to consider, but wrapped them into a story. For, unless you consider each part of the story you will never understand the reason behind the story and then the lesson Jesus is ready for you to discover.

My mother's evening family meals were as complex as a story. Our plates would be filled with separate items of different texture, color, and shape, unlike baby food where everything is mashed together. A meal would consist of meat, vegetables, potatoes or bread, fruit and maybe even cheese. It was only still one meal but had many parts. We also knew we were to eat everything on our plate, for to leave anything behind was to miss the full blessing of the meal. (Beside that, we would not be eligible for desert!)

How often have we heard or read one parable of Jesus, and assumed we were ready to move to the next, assuming we have learned all there is to learn, even though it is likely we have never digested every portion of this meal of Jesus?

We are even guided in understanding a parable by the title inserted into your version of the Bible. (Such headings are not in the text, but added by those who print Bibles.) For instance the heading "Prodigal Son" tempts one to focus on a young lad who lost his inheritance.

But there are other aspects to the story, like the father, the older son who wastes his father's love, and the banquet at the end. Capon helps you to read a parable as if you were reading for the first time, and helping you to clean your plate before you are ready for dessert (or the point Jesus was waiting for you to get to.)

As we read any parable as if for the first time, we are more apt to experience a flavor, taste, or meaning always there, but possibly too subtle to notice. That is the surprise of the Gospel! And every parable help better understand the change Jesus has brought into the world.




