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Catechism Review: Baptism Part 2

Baptism is more than an event; it is our entrance into a lifetime with God. It is a celebration of God's gift of life, and the beginning of a relationship in the warm embrace of God's love. Baptism announces the purpose, blessing, and gift of a life to be lived. There are many ways to help us grow in the freedom it brings and taste the joy which it offers.

Baptism is more than just a necessary ritual; it is the beginning of a lifetime of faith and faithful living. For that reason, pastors meet with parents before the baptism of a first child, as it is a wonderful time to review the elements of this great sacrament. This reminds parents of their unique role in the faith life of their child and God's gift of family.

Children's Bibles and storybooks, Sunday School, Confirmation, sermons, youth group, servant events, and Bible studies are also ways of continuing to grow in the joy of this moment. When an older child or adult is baptized, we might spend even more time helping to answer questions and supporting one's faith journey.

There are many Bible stories that fill the gift of Baptism with deeper meaning. Rather than something we do once, all of these gifts help us to daily grow in the relationship that Baptism begins.

For instance, the story of Noah and Flood illustrates the saving power of Baptism. Just as flood waters destroyed evil that ruined God's creation, that same water lifted up the faithful and carried them into a new life. That is grace!

Exodus provides another illustration. As an infant, Moses was saved from death by floating in a river. As an adult, he led Israel out of slavery in Egypt, through a water crossing. At the same time, the power of that water destroyed the chasing armies of death! So much life begins with water.

After forty years in the desert, it was through another water crossing (the Jordan River) that the waterless life of the desert was ended as God's people entered a land of milk and honey!

At the moment of Jesus' death, John 19 records that blood and water flowed from Jesus' side on

the cross. And his death is referred to in John as an exodus event. Water, water, everywhere!

What powerful reminders these can be of how Holy Baptism frees us from death and carries us into daily journey with a risen Savior! Each time we celebrate a Baptism, we are reminded of our own escape, washing, and being filled with the waters of life. Baptism is a gift which announces our new life of blessing!

Baptism is not dependent on our faith, but is a powerful GIFT of grace, which means it is God's doing, not ours! (For that reason, in an emergency, any Christian can baptize!) From the beginning the Church baptized children born into Christian homes. That commits parents to the great responsibility of teaching their children of the saving power of God in their lives. It also is a responsibility of the congregation to assist and support parents in nurturing each life of fait!

The gift of the Church is that we are the Body of Christ in this time and place. Together we do for each other what sometimes is difficult for any of us to do alone. In other words, we are children and parents to each other and share in this joyful task of affirming our baptismal promise! Baptism brings us into a family and families do all they can to care for and nurture each other.

We have so many ways to help each other grow in the covenant of our baptisms and into active participation in the new family that God gives us as he gathers us together. More than we often realize, it is our example, or what children of all ages see in each of us, that can assist in faith.

When we remember the terrible scene of Jesus' crucifixion and death, we also remember that Jesus looked down at Mary and the disciple John. His words were, "Woman, this is your Son." And to John, "This is your mother!" In baptism, that same gift of a new family in Christ is ours as well.

Our liturgy for worship is based on the belief that Baptism begins our life in Christ. Through Baptism we are renewed, refreshed, nourished, and led into a new way of living that is based on servant love. Baptism is more than something "we do." Much more! It is one of God's great gifts that changes who we are, and how we live.

Some thoughts about the Lord's Prayer (by Frederick Buechner)

In the Episcopal order of worship, the priest sometimes introduces the Lord's Prayer with the words, "Now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say..." The word **bold** is worth thinking about.

We do well not to pray the prayer lightly. It takes guts to pray it at all. We can pray it in the unthinking and perfunctory way we usually do only by disregarding what we are saying.

"Thy will be done" is what we are saying. That is the climax of the first half of the prayer. We are asking God to be God. We are asking God to do not what we want, but what God wants. We are asking God to make manifest the holiness that is now mostly hidden, to set free in all its terrible splendor the devastating power that is now mostly under restraint.

"Thy kingdom come ...on earth" is what we are saying. And if that were suddenly to happen, what then? What would stand and what would fall? Who would be welcomed in and who would be thrown the hell out? Which if any of our most precious visions of what God is and of what human beings are would prove to be more or less on the mark and which would turn out to be phony as three-dollar bills? Boldness indeed. To speak those words is to invite the tiger out of the cage, to unleash a power that makes atomic power look like a warm breeze.

You need to be bold in another way to speak the second half. Give us. Forgive us. Don't test us. Deliver us. If it takes guts to face the omnipotence that is God's, it takes perhaps no less to face the impotence that is ours. We can do nothing without God. We can have nothing without God we are nothing.

It is only the words "Our Father" that make the prayer bearable. If God is indeed something like a father, then as something like children maybe we can risk approaching him anyway."

What About Eulogies?

A friend asked why many churches do not permit eulogies at funerals, while others do. I felt it might be helpful to share our conversation.

Eulogy comes from two Greek words; "eu" means good; "logia" means "words." So eulogy means good words. (Keep that in mind for later!) And so eulogy means good words shared about someone's life.

The first issue in death is to face our grief with love. The price of love means death is a pain-filled moment. No matter how death comes, whether suddenly or slowly, the pain is the same.

Loss is never easy, but it helps to share why someone has been special in our life. It helps to have others affirm why our loved one was so special, as that validates our grief and reminds us that we are not alone. It helps to remember as a way of making sure we don't forget.

A second issue, for people of faith is to confess that Easter as the only good word that can change the loss and finality of death. There is no way to sugarcoat death. It isn't fair. It hurts. And an emptiness results. But for Christians, there is another story which changes this earthly story.

Easter is the primary focus of our faith. It is the best word we can use at the time of death. When earthly death comes, Easter alone can change tears of sadness into tears of joy. There is no word or news better than Easter! No reason for hope, faith, or joy in the face of the earthly pain of death. And these two themes wrap themselves around the rituals in our Christian and cultural encounter with the death,

We should always be mindful of the truth that we are saved, not by what we do, but by what Jesus has done for us! No matter how good anyone has been, death comes to all. Jesus' teaching, and Paul's explanation in Romans, is that faith alone is our hope. Faith, rather than earthly deeds, is what saves us and keeps us close to God's loving gift of grace. Faith, not works!

For some reason, over time, some developed the false idea that that there are things we can do to merit God's love or gain us a foothold on the gift of heaven. The earthly perspective is that the

better one is, the greater the chance God will respond with love. In other words, the better the life, the better the chance that heaven would be the reward.

The Reformers thankfully were able to steer the Church back to the scriptural reality that faith alone is what brings us into and keeps us in a relationship with God. Easter, rather than earthly accomplishments, is the key to finding hope, joy and peace in the face of death.

For that reason, in any Christian funeral or memorial service Easter is the most important issue to celebrate.

At the same time, we have a deepfelt need to bring the unique life story of a loved one into the context of Easter. A pastor's task is to blend the gift of one's earthly life with the miracle of Easter, so that a funeral is more personal and not just pious words. But that is also the gift for every Christian. That is our tradition. It isn't easy, as death is painful for all, but we try.

Outside of faith a eulogy might be the only good word of the day, helping with earthly feelings of loss. Without faith in Easter, good words are the best one can do to feel better and death is still death. All have been to services full of good words but without the power of the gospel shadows will remain. A eulogy is not enough.

Finding a way to lift up the unique gifts of the life of a loved one is much easier when the last good word is Easter and not Death. There are many ways to accomplish this and meet the needs of people in the midst of deep grief. The Gospel must be personal in sermons. Family and friends should share stories, pictures, and memories both at the time of death and even more in the years that follow. But we must always say the best word of all is Easter, and Jesus' loving promise that changes death into eternal life.

It isn't that eulogies aren't permitted, but the Good Word at death must always be the Gospel! It is good to remember the gifts and blessings of a loved one's life. It is even more important to help each other when there are no earthly words capable of changing grief. The best good word of all was the first Easter message, "The tomb is empty! He is risen!" - Pastor Seeber



Book Review: "Every Good Endeavor; Connecting Your Work to God's Work." Timothy Keller. Viking. 2012

Pastor Tim Keller, who recently died, has been a shining lights in making the Gospel interesting and accessible to people of this generation. He grew up Lutheran, was ordained in the Presbyterian Church, and moved from a small congregation in Hopewell, Virginia to begin mission work among the young professionals of Manhattan in New York City.

We live in a time when many say the Christian Church is irrelevant and younger adults are not interested in faith, Keller showed that the message of scripture, is as relevant and powerful as it has ever been. The key is to understand one's audience and let God speak to people's hearts through the biblical text.

While many denominations are going out of their way to let politics and society shape the message of the Gospel, Keller allows the Gospel to be the powerful gift that it is. While many church leaders pontificate with big words, or see large crowds as success, Keller sees the success as what God has done in Christmas and Easter.

Two of his most read books are "The Reason for God" and "The Prodigal God," both of which are available in our library at Zion. His approach is simple. It is biblically based, but shared in understandable words that relate to the life and times of each of us. His congregation in New York City grew to over 10,000 in several different locations. His loss to all of us was softened by the incredible resource of his writing.

How often have you met someone or been introduced by someone else and the first item of information that is requested or shared is where one works or what one does? We tends to identify and judge each other in such fashion. God sees us not by what we do as who we are, and this book is a reminder to look in the mirror as well as at each other in similar fashion.

As we spend so much of our evaluation of ourselves and others based on what is done, rather than who we are, this is what happens. Think about how easily we judge each other by what one does. For instance, some might say "she is a surgeon, I am only a bus driver." Or, "I

am a pastor, and she didn't even finish college." You know how that works and how it feels, right?

Keller uses real world examples, much as Jesus used parables, to illustrate the biblical points he wishes to share. For instance, he refers to Peter Schafer's play "Amadeus" to talk about work.

Antonio Salieri was a successful writer of operas and court composer to the Hapsburg emperor. IN every worldly sense he was successful, and yet when he heard the music of Amadeus Mozart he heard an incredible genius, much greater than he could ever become. And from then on his work became one of frustration and envy, for he could never compare with Mozart. That is a tension we have all felt in our own lives as we judge ourselves and others in the same way.

Keller begins with the first chapters of Genesis and the message that we are created in the image of God the Creator. And so, we are created to create; to care for, to produce, to nurture, to protect in our own ways with the gifts and opportunities God blesses each with.

Keller echoes much of what Martin Luther wrote about work and our calling (vocation) as Christians. You might forget that in Luther's day, the vocation of holy orders (priests and nuns) was seen as the greatest earthly glory, and the daily efforts of serfs and peasants was seen as less than important. But Luther made certain people understood that fathers and mothers were the bishops and priests of their children as they were responsible for bringing them to faith.

Luther wrote extensively about and sees work as part of God's plan for each of us, as a way of honoring God and utilizing the gifts and opportunities we have in our daily work. Keller continues and expands in this very readable and practical book.

Keller uses concrete examples to show how we have been created to work, and that work is how we give honor to God and serve those around us. When that is how we see ourselves, others will as well, and success or satisfaction is based on our joy in serving God and neighbor rather than only in salary, accolades, titles, or awards. I wish this book had been available while I was struggling with whether or not I was in the right vocation.
