Yes, sunglasses for less than two bucks. No, they weren't on clearance or sold "as is" with maybe one of the lenses missing, but I bought a pair of disposable glasses to be worn when looking at a solar eclipse.

In case you haven't heard, on April 8th we here in North America will experience a solar eclipse, with a total solar eclipse happening just south of us in Indiana and Ohio.

A solar eclipse happens when the moon, which circles the earth once every 27.33 days, is directly between the earth and the sun. A "total" eclipse means that, from the perspective of the earth, the moon fully covers (or blocks) the sun. In essence, the moon blocks the sun's light from getting to earth for the few minutes it takes for the moon to move across the path of light the sun constantly sends us.

And because the earth is always rotating, when a solar eclipse happens there's only a small area of earth that can experience a "total" eclipse. Again, that total eclipse is happening very near us this time. Here in western Michigan, we'll have about 90% of a total solar eclipse, so if the weather is good and the sun out (a big "if," I know!) we will definitely notice the shadow of the moon upon the earth, making the daytime feel like twilight.

With the right eyewear, such as the throw-away glasses I bought, you can look up toward the solar eclipse and see the outline of the moon as it passes through the sun's rays. Of course, it's an absolutely terrible idea to try to look up at the sun without protective eye wear. So don't do it!

The idea of looking up and seeing the sun is an almost too obvious metaphor of how we, the people of God, are to live on a daily basis.

In the brilliant light of Easter, we look to the Son, we look to God's only Son and our Risen and Living Savior. The entire month of April is part of the season of Easter and our continual celebration of Jesus' victory over sin, death and the power of the devil.

Thus, even as you plan to look at the sun on April 8th, may the Lord give us faith to look to the Son each day!

As some disciples declared in John 12:21, "We would like to see Jesus."

Let us ask the Holy Spirit to give us those eyes of faith that we would see Jesus at work in our lives each and every day. Only by His grace are we made to see Him.

Catechism Review The Lord's Prayer (part 4)

"Give Us Daily Bread"

When we hear "daily bread" we think "food." Our hope is that God will never let us get hungry. But is this a demand or a reminder of what food is?

And what about people of faith who don't have daily food and are still hungry? Is God not listening, or do you think God is unaware of the needs of his hungry children? What is our request for daily bread really about?

For many, a food crisis is eating out because I don't want to cook or having one donut instead of two. What we don't need we freeze. What we will eat next week is already in a box somewhere. Most don't really understand the concept of daily bread as Jesus intended.

For Jesus (as for many still today) it was different. In his culture, bread could never be taken for granted. It took an entire season to grow grain. Then it was harvested, threshed, and ground into flour. There were no freezers or 24 hour grocery stores if extra guests suddenly appeared.

Every day, someone in the family spent most of the daylight hours mixing, kneading, leavening, and baking for the one evening meal. When each meal might be the last, daily bread was the essence of life! Daily bread is shorthand for what keeps us alive.

When we got our puppy, the first thing she did each morning was run to the food dish to see if there was food. What a basic instinct! But isn't it embarrassing when a puppy is more aware of dependence on me than I am on God?

This prayer reminds me to pay attention to where food comes from! It is about the miracle of life! Heavenly manna!

And what is daily bread for me might not be the same for another. To keep me alive, I might need a job, a home, or loved ones who care. When we ask for daily bread we are asking God for the stuff that keeps life going. It is about what I need, rather than what I want. It is remembering where to go for such shopping.

Most eat whether they deserve to or not. And many are hungry, whether they deserve to be or

not. Sometimes evil ones receive a banquet and sometimes the faithful endure famine. Why pray if God has other plans?

This prayer helps me focus so that when I eat; I celebrate God. And when I share daily bread with others, I am sharing God. This prayer opens our living to live-giving nourishment from God that can fill us as no other food. If God is Creator, then God is Owner. And if God is Owner, then all we have to support and sustain life is a "gift."

Don't forget God's gifts of sunlight, gravity, rain, fertile soil, a balance between good insect and pest, and so on and so forth. Daily bread is the gift of a God who has created all things and a plan so that life might be sustained and replenished.

It's amusing to watch birds fight over a slice of bread. They attack, steal, and squawk over what is more than any one could eat. If smart, they would divide the bread so each could eat rather than leaving some bruised and bloody or without anything to take back to their nests. And that becomes another lesson, as we understand gifts are given to be shared.

If I have life and someone else is hungry, this prayer reminds that just as Jesus love is shared so it is shared through me! And when I remember daily bread is a gift, then I understand how I use it becomes an act of worship in itself.

Remember the story of stone soup! A village starved by selfishness, was slowly gathered around a stranger, boiling a pot full of water and a rock. His word "it is good" convinced them that it was nourishing. As each added gifts of vegetables and seasoning, an entire village received and was transformed by the daily bread of grace. Jesus' word, "I am bread of life" has done the same for me!

Israel used bread of life as shorthand for the words of scripture, for they saw that as the nourishment for their spiritual lives just as manna kept them alive in the desert.

Jesus is our Bread of Life, and nourishes us from an empty tomb. As we pray we remember. As we remember we are fed. As we are fed, we are strengthened for service. Give us daily bread indeed! Thank you! Amen.

Baptism, Confirmation, and Affirmation

On April 28th some of our young people will be confirmed in their commitment to the faith of their Baptism. That makes this a good time to review what that means for all of us.

Many of us grew up with Confirmation Day as a public day to celebrate and recognize the fact that we were no longer children in Sunday School but moving into our teenage years.

There are times in our lives when we celebrate milestones of our lives. And this was a milestone for surviving several years of extra instruction in the Christian faith under the guidance of a pastor, DCE, or other adults who helped with instruction.

In the middle of the last century pastors of the major Lutheran church bodies in the U.S. spent a decade of study to come up with agreement upon guidelines for this important ministry. The goal was to review how we understand and practice this ministry. For too long this was seen by many as a right of passage and a graduation from education in the congregation. The goal of the study was to integrate this process into our lifelong journey of faith.

It was felt by many that an opportunity of major significance in the lives of our young people was being missed. Confirmation had become viewed in the same way as graduation ceremonies. Many perceived this as a moment in time for dresses, suit coats, and pictures rather than a transition into a more adult journey of faith.

In 1971 the major Lutheran churches in the U.S. adopted this statement: "Confirmation is a pastoral and educational ministry of the church that is designed to help baptized children identify with the life and mission of the adult Christian community, and that is celebrated in a public rite."

This was an important opportunity for all of us as the focus on continued spiritual growth rather than an end to such growth was the emphasis of this affirmation. Our formal process of growing into our faith has the following components.

Baptism is our Sacrament of initiation, in which we celebrate God's gift of faith in our lives which is lived

out as a member of the Body of Christ on earth, which we call "the Church."

Baptism is a Sacrament of washing, which announces cleansing and rebirth. With the washing of water, the pastor **confirms** the faith of God's child with a "hands on" blessing and the sign of the cross.

At baptism, parents, godparents, and the entire congregation make a commitment to help the newly baptized to grow in their faith. This is a community effort and a privilege we all share in helping each other to mature into the faith which baptism gifts us with.

The desire of Lutheran congregations was to see the ministry of confirmation in similar fashion.

We now define **Confirmation** as a lifelong pastoral and educational ministry of the Church. It is a response to the promises at Baptism and a concerted effort to help our young people fully identify with and participate in the mission and ministry of the Church.

The witness of Christian family and friends, Sunday School, worship, and our Confirmation ministry prepares our youth people for the day when they stand before of the congregation to publicly embrace their Christian faith.

Our youth AFFIRM their faith, and the Pastor CONFIRMS their faith with a blessing and the laying on of hands just as with Baptism.

We call this rite the **Affirmation of Baptism**. The process that prepares our youth for this celebration is our **Confirmation Ministry**.

This is a special and powerful moment for the entire congregation to stand with our youth as they prepare for the next years of their journey of faith! And so, this is not a graduation but a mile marker and a wonderful opportunity for our young people to say "I get it!" And the journey then moves forward in new ways.

This is a special day for all of us, for we are in this journey together! It is worthy of celebration, special remembrances, and the support of the entire congregation, both for our youth as well as their family and friends.

The Sharing of Peace / Offering

In Jesus' day, sacrifices were brought to the temple as a sign of people's love for God and desire to surrender something of value to show that love. Christians kept that practice and brought gifts to share in worship.

The first Christians often gathered for a meal before worship (the first potlucks!) Others brought gifts of bread and wine for their feast of Holy Communion. They even pooled resources to take care of the needy in their midst or in other congregations.

In the Sharing of Peace we remember this practice and participate in our way today. Its roots come from the words of Jesus. He said: "So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift." (Matt. 5:23-24 ESV)

In other words, if anything stands between you and a neighbor, something stands between you and God! If we can't give to each other, how can we expect our gifts to God to have any real meaning? If we truly love God, we will truly love our neighbor. And before we share in God's meal for us, we first share his grace with each other.

In a sense, we are setting the table for Holy Communion as we share Christ's peace (our greatest gift) with each other. It is like washing our hands or giving thanks as we welcome, embrace, and share the love of Jesus as we prepare again to be nourished in a miraculous moment.

This is not just a quick hello, but a reminder of how Christ has welcomed and forgiven me with his love! My response is to reach out with that same love; to be one with you and the God has made himself one with me!

In worship we share that confession and the warmth of that love with each other. Better yet, if there is anyone you have a problem with, don't wait, go to them in private, ahead of time. Settle differences, and forgive. That allows our public

display of peace to be even more meaningful. As we gather in worship, we truly are one in Christ, and rejoice he has helped us regain such peace. In sharing his peace, we are given the opportunity to make Jesus' words of forgiveness come to life.

This is what reaching out with Jesus' love looks and feels like. This celebrates our joy in not only receiving God's gifts but sharing the gift of his peace with each other.

This is serious, joyful, spirit-filled business, not pretend or for show. If you are not willing to forgive and be forgiven, what meaning does God's gift of grace have for you?) Christ has died to make peace! We must live in peace! As we share the peace of the Lord we are reminded how such a gift is to be shared daily, faithfully, and lovingly!

For Parents with Younger Children

You know how important it is to hug your kids. They need more than just words. And after moments of chastisement or critique they need even more to know you love them still! When I tell my kids I am sorry, I had better physically show them the same thing.

Words without action have a hollow ring. This is what we are doing in worship as we share the peace of the Lord. We are saying to each other, "Jesus loves me, and I want you to be touched by that same love!"

We know how tempers can flare, and voices can be raised in discipline (and then wish we had first counted to ten and maybe not been so intense.) We also know how warm and humbling it is when our little ones come back to us anyway (whether it is the next day or even years later) and say, "I love you Dad! I love you Mom!" We can learn much from them! This moment in worship is no less powerful.

Just as we embrace words of forgiveness and love at home, we must learn to do that in worship and our daily living. Liturgy is often something we don't think about, but in the repetition of reaching out this becomes a more natural action of faith. (Just like learning to brush teeth or pick up clothes.) When we do it often and regularly, we do it as naturally as breathing. And what a holy breeze the sharing of peace becomes!

Book Review. "As Kingfishers Catch Fire; A Conversation on the Ways of God Formed by the Words of God. Eugene Peterson. 2017.

Eugene Peterson was an incredible wordsmith, theologian, artist, pastor, and poet. As I read this book I was energized and excited by his remarkable use of words to convey the practical and useful daily life lessons based on Scripture.

I have read many of Peterson's books which have been helpful in my ministry, but never read a book of his sermons. While a collection of sermons might sound less than exciting, but I assure you that any time you spend with this book will be time well spent. The book has a sampling of sermons from every part of Scripture. You need not read book from beginning to end but might decide to read only sections of the prophet Isaiah, some Gospels, or possibly some of the letters of Paul.

This is a wonderful devotional book that could be picked up from time to time as inspiration for daily living. For Peterson's efforts in his preaching were to provide practical, daily assistance for life that are guided and flavored by the words of a particular section of scripture.

Each sermon offers remarkable background helps to a particular text to better understand the audience and setting for words of Isaiah, David, Paul, or even Jesus. So often we take scripture so out of context that we lose the fullness of what is shared.

The book is divided into sections, such as "Preaching in the Company of Moses" with the sermons in that section all being based on texts from Genesis through Deuteronomy. One section is based on texts from the book of Psalms. And for each section he beings with a wonderful commentary that explains the background, times, and needs of those particular texts.

As an example, Psalm 1 discusses "meditating" on God's words. He discusses how the word literally means "to slowly chew on something." That puts an entirely new spin on the idea of mediation, especially when he discusses how Isiah uses that same word to discuss how a lion dealt with its prey. Peterson suggests meditate is too tame a word for what the Hebrew really meant and if we consider meditating over God's word as chewing, swallowing, and digesting God's gifts to

us so that they become part of us, we have a fuller understanding of the benefit of such a diet.

Peterson uses the word "congruence" to talk about his preaching style. Congruence has to do with establishing harmony or agreement between two objects. The goal is that they mirror each other, or connect to each other in the appropriate way. His lifelong effort in preaching was to do all that he could to connect words from Scripture in a meaning-full way so that they might more easily be digested and embraced in a practical and helpful way for his congregation.

What helps him in that effort is his lifelong effort to not only wrestle with the holy but also the broken real world in which we live. His sermons are full of connections (congruences he would say) of poetry, art, and life to give deeper insight into the world and words of scripture.

The Bible is presented in black and while letters that form words. We believe those words are inspired by God but he also inspires how we read and make those words a diet that changes us from the inside out. The Bible is more than easy answers to tough questions, but a diet that helps us wrestle with questions instead of assuming we have quick and easy answers.

A sample from a sermon on Psalm 29:2 ("worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness") follows:

"Beauty: splendor, grandeur, adornment. Life—core existence—spills over the containers of mere survival or utility. There is something more going in this world that just getting over the street. And holiness: an interior fire, a passion for living in and for God, a capacity for exuberance in the presence of God. There are springs deep within and around us form which we can drink an sing God. Beauty is the outside and holiness is the inside of what is essentially the same thing: life full and vibrant, life God created and God blessed When we sense the pulse and surge of life within and around us, our spontaneous response is to worship." This is a book to pick up form time to time when you are thirsty, hungry, or feeling something is missing. His sermons are powerful, easy to read, and practical for real people in a real world. This book is in our library.


